By answering the questions in the National Travel Attitudes Study (NTAS), you could make a difference to government transport planning and policy development. The findings can also be used by academics, businesses and the general public, as well as by campaigning organisations representing a wide range of groups, including motorists, cyclists, motorcyclists, the elderly, rural communities and children.

Get your views heard

Everyone we have invited to take part has been selected to provide a truly representative picture of people living in England. It doesn't matter how much or how little you travel; to get a good, representative picture, we need to include people of all ages and backgrounds.



By taking part you'll be making your opinion on important travel and environmental issues count and ensuring that your views, and the views of people like you, are represented. Taking part in the study is voluntary; if you decide not to join in however, this means that your experience is less likely to be taken into account in transport planning.

How does this differ to the National Travel Survey (NTS)?

The NTAS's primary aim is to understand your attitudes to and experiences of a host of issues related to transport. Whilst NTS focuses mainly on how you travel and for what purpose, we want to know your thoughts on such topics as climate change, transport provision for people with disabilities, phone use while driving and other topical issues.



In 2019, **42%** of NTAS respondents agreed that the **price of a plane ticket** should reflect the **environmental damage** that flying causes, even if this makes air travel much more expensive.



In 2019, **59%** of NTAS respondents agreed that **speed cameras save lives**, while **41%** felt like speed cameras are **mostly there to make money**.


